

Margaret Nunley Pension Application Documents

Margaret's first husband was John Orrick (1827-1862) who fought with the 5th TN (South), was wounded at the battle of Shiloh, then removed to Corinth MS where he died of those wounds. John pronounced his last name as 'Ark' but DNA testing proves he is a descendant of Orricks in Maryland and elsewhere.

In 1866 or 1867, Margaret married William B. Nunley (1801?-1889) who already had many children from his first wife Sarah Jane Smartt. William fought for the North and his Margaret applied for a pension in his name.

Lieut Brewer had been to see Ark and said Ark was bound to die, said he wanted to see us boys, I went to see him immediately. Ark told affiant he was bound to die. Affiant ~~says~~ he died soon after he was there as he was informed by Lieut Brewer. Affiant says he did not see Ark after his death.

Affiant further deposes and says that there were about 100 men belonging to said Company to which he belonged, but at the present time he knows of only about six now surviving to his knowledge. 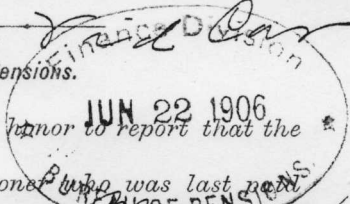
